



Political Situation

- Westminster has little relevance almost all relevant areas are devolved;
- Stormont is paralyzed the locus of most of the power, but institutionally hamstrung;
- Local Government is the only still functioning lever.



Parenting NI



2014 reform gave two key responsibilities/powers;

- Community Planning done in partnership with other public service providers and departments in order to collectively address local problems.
 Gave councils more influence on how and where services are provided.
- General Power of Competence allows a council to act with similar freedom to an individual, unless there is a law to prevent it from doing so. A council can act in its own interest and develop innovative approaches to help improve the economic, social and environmental well-being of its area.



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What are we asking for?

- In the most simple form to help parents;
- To do more to engage with, support and empower parents in local council areas;
- To stop leaving it all to a moribund Assembly and to take initiative on dealing with the challenges identified;
- More specifically, to sign up to four promises, and four commitments.



Promises:

- Promising to invest in parent employees wellbeing in the workplace.
- Promise to put in place community based, evidence informed programmes to build parenting confidence and skills.
- Promising to train council staff in the importance of working in partnership with parents and how to engage parents.
- Promising to seek the opinion of parents explicitly when consulting on services for children or young people





Commitments:

- ✓ Committing to specifically name parents (or those in a parenting role) whenever a policy, strategy or initiative mentions children.
- Committing to explore strategies to support parents specifically and practically, including inclusion in community plans.
- Committing to working with other councils, departments and the third sector to make Northern Ireland as parent friendly as possible
- Nominating an elected member on every council to serve as a "Parent Champion".
