C155/16 Declarations of Interest

The Deputy Chair reminded Members of their responsibility with regard to declarations of interest.

C156/16 Chair's Business

Councillor McGinley advised Members that Councillor C O'Neill had given birth to twins. The Chair, Councillor Wilson extended congratulations to the Councillor C O'Neill.

Councillor Cuddy stated that he had represented Council at the 100th year commemoration of the Battle of the Somme in the North of France a trip which has been the highlight of his career with Council. The Councillor extended thanks to fellow Members for affording him the opportunity and reflected how he had been touched by the commemoration and stated that in reflecting on a battle which demonstrated man's in humanity to man all should be mindful to make better decisions.

Councillor Mallaghan reflected on the undernoted motion moved by Councillor McFlynn and the amendment proposed by himself also undernoted which was carried at the Council meeting on 25 June 2015.

That this council recognises the dangers posed to the public and to the environment by the illegal burning of tyres at bonfires and similar; strongly opposes this activity; and calls on statutory agencies, landowners, the PSNI, and the fire and rescue service to work with this council, in a co-ordinated multi-agency approach to bring this harmful and irresponsible activity to an end.

Amendment proposed by Councillor Mallaghan.

We welcome that the Minister of the Environment through his Agency the NIEA will bring in appropriate measures which adequately deal with used tyres as the current system does not rigidly control how suppliers do this. That this Council does not clean up the remains from bonfires from any other property that does not belong to Council. On Council property that is used for bonfires, only suitable materials are used and all other materials such as tyres, rubbish, flags, election posters or effigies of individuals are removed. That this Council seeks to prosecute through its powers anyone who illegally dumps any hazardous materials on public or private lands associated to bonfires.

Councillor Bateson entered the meeting at 7.05pm

Councillor Mallaghan sought an update as to the outcome of bonfires in July 2015.

In response the Director of Environment and Properties advised that following the motion in June 2015 there had been a number of multi-agency meetings led by the Director of Business and Communities. He further stated that there had been a couple of surveys conducted in relation to bonfires on Council owned land at which time the bonfire material had been mostly wood although on a number of occasions tyres had been present. The Director advised that all bonfire sites on Council owned lands had been cleared. With regard to the tyres the Director advised that the Northern Ireland Environment Agency had been contacted but had stated that they would only remove the tyres from a safe place not actual bonfire sites. It was further noted that there had been no change in legislation and that there was no means of tracing the origins of the tyre. The Director clarified that there was six bonfires on Council owned property but that many of the bonfires across the district were not on Council property and emphasised that Council had not cleared the latter. It was noted that Council was in receipt of a Freedom of Information request regarding the cost of clean-ups following bonfires.

Councillor Mallaghan stated that the motion of Council had not been carried out.

The Director of Environment and Properties stated that the safety of staff is paramount and risk assessments are required with regard to removal of any materials dumped on Council property. With relation to materials dumped on private

property removal of same is the responsibility of the landowner or those responsible for dumping. The Director confirmed that on the basis of staff safety no material was cleared away prior to the 11 July.

Councillor Kearney requested that Professor Declan McKenna a resident of the district be considered for a civic award for achievements in relation to prostate cancer research. Councillor Kearney stated that prostate cancer was the most common cancer in men in Northern Ireland.

Councillor McNamee referred back to the discussion on bonfires and stated that the fire at the Killymoon site at Cookstown was constructed by non-residents and that many residents were extremely annoyed especially as it had contained tyres, which the PSNI had brought to his attention were traceable and named the owner.

Councillor Molloy stated that the wishes of the Council had not been adhered to and whilst safety of staff is paramount there were numerous agencies who would remove tyres as burning of same was detrimental to the environment. Councillor Molloy asked since Council paid to clean up the debris post bonfires why action was not taken beforehand.

In response to queries raised the Director of Public Health and Infrastructure stated that in relation to the named owner of the tyres this was an illegal dumping matter which the NIEA would investigate.

With regard to the bonfire sites the Director advised that discussions had taken place with the Northern Ireland Environment Agency prior to the celebratory event and they had stated they were working on a province wide basis and thus Council was expected to retrieve the tyres and bring them to an appointed place. The Director stated that he was not aware of any Council that had done this and that in the lead up to the bonfires any tyres spotted on sites had been reported directly to the NIEA for investigation. In relation to the Killymoon bonfire site the Director stated that there had been liaison with the PSNI.

The Chair, Councillor Wilson stated that Council should await the report.

Councillor T Quinn advised that he had raised issues in relation to the Killymoon site at the last meeting of the PCSP and that it was his understanding that his was the only contentious site in the district of Mid Ulster. The Councillor emphasised that moving forward much work need to be undertaken to find a solution to what was a contentious situation.

Councillor Cuddy stated that in the past when tyres were being taken for the bonfire at Milltown site Dungannon local tyre suppliers had been asked to ensure tyres were locked away at night and the situation greatly improved. Councillor Cuddy emphasised the importance of tyre providers dealing with disposal of old tyres responsibly and stated that forthcoming bonfires in relation to 'Internment Commemorations' also needed to be monitored.

Councillor Mulligan concurred with Councillor Cuddy's earlier sentiments regarding attendance at the Somme Commemorations. Councillor Mulligan drew attention to the renovations which had taken place in the Chamber stating that in the legacy Council the tiered layout had been changed due to health and safety legislation and asked had there been a change in the legislation. Drawing attention to the steps Councillor Mulligan stated that they could cause a fall and expressed concern regarding lack of consultation. In response the Chair, Councillor Wilson stated that the Director of Environment and Property would investigate.

Councillor Bateson advised that he had been contacted by the Christian Fellowship in relation to use of a car park in Maghera. He stated that whilst there was issues in relation to car park designation which may prohibit its use he requested that the matter be looked at to see if a solution could be identified.

Councillor Mallaghan left the meeting at 7.13 pm

In response, the Chair Councillor Wilson stated that the issue would be raised at the Environment Committee. The Director of Environment and Property stated that he was aware of the situation and time limitations would not permit committee consideration and stated that if an alternative venue could be identified the Chair of the Environment Committee could grant permission as a matter of urgency. It was noted that use of off street car parking was legislated under the Parking Order.

Councillor Mallaghan returned to the meeting at 7.15 pm

The Chair, Councillor Wilson extended congratulations to David Ames and Iain Sloan in relation to their forthcoming participation in the Olympic games, the Chair emphasised that their achievement was great for them personally and Cookstown hockey club.

- C165/16 Consideration of Motion

C165.1/16 Councillor McGinley to move

Councillor McGinley thanked the Chair for his efforts to accommodate the forthcoming discussion stating that he had originally requested a special meeting of Council but this had not proved possible due to the holiday period together with diary commitments.

Reflecting that the matter was no less urgent as people were very anxious Councillor McGinley stated that although at present nothing had changed the potential is that everything would. The Councillor emphasised that the sting of Brexit would be truly felt if and when 'Article 50' is triggered and the support and resources is cut from critical areas with only the empty promises of the leave campaign to fill the gaps. He continued that the referendum result had clearly stated that the citizens of the North had voted to remain in the European Union and it was the vote of the people of England that would create major challenges for people, for the economy and for relationships across Ireland.

Councillor McGinley drew particular attention to the concerns of the business community, the voluntary and community sector together with the agriculture and tourism sectors emphasizing that Brexit would adversely impact on the North's economy. The Councillor emphasized that the 'leave campaign' was opposed by the vast majority of citizens in the North nationalists, unionists and republicans alike and stressed that the position to remain in the EU, expressed by voters from across the community, must be respected and further stressed that it was not a done deal but a 'live issue'.

In order to recognise the vote of the people of the North, Councillor McGinley said that all options must be explored and he believed that an 'all island' wide dialogue was needed in the aftermath of the referendum result. The Councillor stated that there was now an opening to examine new relationships for everyone who lives on the island of Ireland and that the opportunity should be seized.

Councillor McGinley stated that it was his understanding that the issue of 'brexit' had been added to the councils risk register and stated that he hoped to hear from the officers what the main concerns were and asked if there had been any exercise conducted identifying the most vulnerable organisations, sectors or areas within this council area.

In conclusion Councillor McGinley stated that the situation created required careful navigation and thus moved the undernoted motion:

That this council recognises the democratic deficit created by the result of the EU referendum.

Further recognises that as political leaders we have to work together to give effect to the democratically expressed decision of the people to remain in the EU and to put the needs of all our people and economy across the island of Ireland to the fore.

Calls on the executive office to articulate the will of the electorate here in the north who clearly voted to remain.

Councillor McPeake seconded the motion and spoke of the negativity, anger, resentment and fear across the community especially from agriculture and food sectors, community and voluntary sector and farmers. He further reflected on the last Rural Development Programme which had delivered £17m in programmes and a further £14m in match funding, the businesses which had received money leading to

the creation of 180 jobs, improved rural childcare and community group funding. The Councillor emphasised that the future was bleak highlighting also the plight of farmers and the end of the single farm payment.

Councillor McPeake mentioned a CPI report which highlighted that a random business survey had revealed that 92% of businesses anticipated a negative in the next 5 years due to Brexit. The Councillor stated that the motion was timely and all must work together emphasising that a lot of people who had voted to leave, if given the opportunity would now vote to remain.

Councillor G Shiels shared some national statistics relating to the first guarter of trading in goods and services and stated that there was a new optimism hitting the economy. The Councillor also stated that the United Kingdom had been destined for a recession prior to the referendum and it was rich of others to speak of the losses to the farming industry when the fishing industry had suffered greatly in the EU, milk farmers and the production of milk was trailing the ground and that now the United Kingdom had the opportunity to control its own destiny. Councillor G Shiels emphasised that since Britain had voted to leave the EU many other countries were discussing to do likewise and it may not be long before the Ard Fheis was calling to pull out and the Republic of Ireland doing likewise when they realise that the benefits of the European Union were coming to an end. Reflecting on newspaper headlines Councillor G Shiels drew attention to the successful contract secured by Wright Buses in Ballymena emphasising that these buses were not going to mainland Europe and a further article highlighted what the EU spent their money on. In conclusion Councillor G Shiels stated that there were many untruths but that the next three months will show improvement.

Councillor Cuthbertson stated that there had been one referendum not five and it was clear that the people either voted 'yes' to remain in the European Union or 'no' to leave. The Councillor stated that he was a member of the DUP and that they had been the only party who had campaigned for a leave vote and thus he was pleased with the outcome emphasising that whilst it was not a great start it was only the start of the road and there are many countries queuing up to do trade with the UK and the USA were lifting the ban on UK lamb and beef rules so it was not all 'doom and gloom'. In conclusion Councillor Cuthbertson stated that whilst he was campaigning for the Assembly elections 99.5% of farmers had indicated they would vote to leave and the sooner the UK was out of the EU the better it would be.

Councillor Kearney proposed the undernoted amendment:

"That this Council calls on the British Government to respect the will of 56% of the people of the North who voted to remain within the EU.

Requests an urgent meeting with representatives of the Irish and British Governments."

Councillor Kearney congratulated the 25,612 Mid Ulster citizens, 60.4% from different backgrounds and political parties who sent out a clear message to remain in the EU. He advised that the SDLP had conducted and extensive canvass in support of remain and five weeks on the canvass continues due to pressure from the business, farming and community sectors seeking clarification on a way forward.

Councillor Kearney emphasised that the SDLP would continue to endeavour that the democratic will of the people would be respected and had met with parties across the Island of Ireland and Heads of State across the Continent to establish the growing consensus that the will of the people should not be ignored. Drawing attention to the fact that 53 years ago both Ireland and the UK had joined the then EEC Councillor Kearney highlighted the benefits such as co-operation, peace, stability, opportunity and citizenship of Europe in the aftermath of two world wars, poverty and famine. He reflected that John Hume had encouraged this and that given the terrible events across Europe in recent day's peace was vulnerable and there was sufficient evidence that many still lived in poverty.

Councillor Kearney emphasised that the aftermath of the referendum had resulted in a prolonged era of uncertainty highlighting growing austerity, crisis in agriculture, education, freedom of movement, goods and services, wavering currency rates all of which were critical to an industrial hub such as Mid Ulster. He recalled that the EU membership had permitted businesses to flourish and funding had been generous to Ireland both North and South but stated that the most vulnerable in society would now suffer and areas such as agriculture and agri-food was most concerning and outlined supporting statistics of existing EU funding.

Stating that Brexit would overshadow the remainder of the current Council term he emphasised that Council must instigate discussions on behalf of businesses, farmers and community groups and stated that future generations would suffer the results of the ill-conceived Brexit outcomes. Councillor Kearney sought support for the motion stating the 56% of the people of the North voted to remain and the rightful place was within the EU.

Councillor M Quinn seconded the amendment and stated that like Scotland the North of Ireland had voted to remain in the EU and drew attention to the fact that the newly elected Prime Minister had visited Scotland and stated that she would consider their wishes to remain in the EU. The Councillor emphasised that the SDLP would use every tool available to prevent the North leaving the EU emphasising that the will of the English is not the will of local people, they had not given their consent to leave the EU and thus membership should be upheld.

Councillor McLean stated that he would outline a couple of anomalies namely that neither the SDLP nor SF recognised that Northern Ireland is part of the United Kingdom and were not 'the North'. He thus concurred with Councillor Cuthbertson's earlier comments and emphasised that in the Council Chamber a majority vote wins and that both the UUP and DUP had been forced down routes due to a nationalist majority. Councillor McLean in conclusion stated that the DUP Leader, First Minister had stated that she would ensure that Northern Ireland would get the best deal possible.

Councillor Reid stated that nine out of ten farmers known to him had voted to leave the EU as only one third of British money paid into the EU was returned. He made reference to the milk quotas and the detrimental impact they had had on dairy farmers and also the grain prices rising which had killed farming. Councillor Reid concurred with earlier comments that the referendum had been a clear 'yes or no' vote. Councillor Bateson drew attention to the requirement for the Good Friday agreement which emphasised that different considerations was needed. He further stated that those who had led the 'leave' vote had no plans in place to deal with the issues which had arisen and could not believe that they had won.

The Director of Organisational Development left the meeting at 7.55pm

Councillor Mallaghan stated that no one really knew what the future would hold but stated that it was known that Lloyds was cutting 9000 jobs across the UK, that local companies such as Greiner Packaging had expanded due to funding from the European Union and that Moypark following the Brexit vote may move their headquarters to Dublin. Reflecting on some of the aforementioned articles regarding global trading Councillor Mallaghan highlighted that a company had had a machine delivery delayed because of customs paperwork and that in the past he had spent time in the continent waiting at borders. He emphasised that the 'doom and gloom' were facts and that four weeks into the decision to leave the EU he was not sure that all the statistics was there to suggest growth.

Councillor McPeake stated that in relation to over-reaction if anyone thinks that the Conservative government would prioritise the North particularly in terms of agriculture they were mistaken as their priorities would lie with banks and businesses and drew on the irony of the DUP Minister for Agriculture going to Brussels looking money for dairy farmers.

Councillor Molloy referred to earlier comments regarding beef exports and stated that the lifting of restrictions with the USA was not due to Brexit but had been ongoing for the past two years and the South were already utilising the new legislation.

Councillor McLean stated that the comments from Sinn Féin were 'a little bit rich' given that the SDLP had taken the lead on Brexit in Mid Ulster and Sinn Féin had not been at the schools for the voting nor at the count as they had been during the Assembly elections.

Councillor Cuthbertson said that it was ironic that members of Sinn Féin were stating what was best for Northern Ireland people when they belonged to a party who had bombed the heart out of the country for years.

Councillor B McGuigan in relation to Councillor McLean's earlier comments in regarding the referendum election campaign stated that he had visited a number of polling stations with Ian Milne MLA and could not understand the comments made.

Councillor Clarke referred to the comments of Councillor Cuthbertson and stressed that it was very serious to say that SF was the party that bombed the heart out of the North and that the statement needed to be withdrawn.

Councillor Clarke advised that on the day of the referendum election he had carried out the same actions as those of previous elections and stated that in relation to agriculture the UK policy would be for cheap food as 98% of people did not belong to the rural community. The Councillor emphasised that this would lead to meat entering the market with no history its origin, he also stated that if Brexit was carried through farming would be non-existent and companies such as Moy Park would be gone.

Councillor Reid stated that now the vote had been taken all signs and election posters should be taken down.

The Chair, Councillor Wilson stated that there was no doubt that there was uncertainty but the referendum was over and the result was to leave. The Chair emphasised that it was now essential for Stormont to respond swiftly, that Northern Ireland was part of the UK and the vote was to leave and the Prime Minister had stated that 'Brexit meant Brexit' and it was fantasy to believe that Northern Ireland could opt out.

The Chair stated that whilst it was good to see neighbouring countries prosper the primary concern of Mid Ulster Council must be Northern Ireland and whilst Ireland had five million people it was economic madness to ignore the 60 million in the UK. He stressed that Northern Ireland had a land border and the priority of the Northern Ireland Executive was to plan for the way forward.

Councillor McGinley stated that he would remind fellow Members that the majority of people in Mid Ulster had voted to remain in the EU and requested that their decision was respected.

The Chair, Councillor Wilson called for a vote on the amendment as undernoted:

That this Council calls on the British Government to respect the will of 56% of the people of the North who voted to remain within the EU.

Requests an urgent meeting with representatives of the Irish and British Governments."

The Councillor commended the year on year success stating that it portrayed the partnership of the Ulster Council, Tyrone County Board, Mid Ulster District Council, the capital grants scheme, Schools and Clubs and wished the team every success in the forthcoming All Ireland competition stating that the team would be there on the third Sunday of September for the final.

Councillor B McGuigan seconded the motion and stated that as a Derry man he did recognise that they were strong contenders and wished the team every success and truly hoped the team would bring the 'Sam Maguire' Cup back to the District.

The Vice Chair, Councillor McAleer concurred with Councillor Mallaghan and wished Mickey Harte and the team every success.

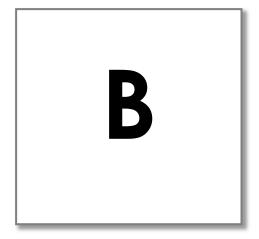

P137/16 Apologies

Councillors McAleer and Mullen.

It was noted that Councillor Mallaghan would join the meeting later.

P138/16 Declarations of Interest

The Chair reminded members of their responsibility with regard to declarations of interest.

Councillor Kearney declared an interest in planning application LA09/2016/0164/F and advised he would speak on this item later in the meeting.

P139/16 Chair's Business

The Chair reminded members of the public attending the meeting to speak on an application that they had a maximum of three minutes speaking time.

P140/16 Confirm Minutes of the Planning Committee Meeting held on Tuesday 5 July 2016

Proposed by Councillor Robinson Seconded by Councillor Bell and **Resolved** That the minutes of the meeting of the Planning Committee held on Tuesday 5 July 2016, (P127/16 – P132/16 & P136/16), were considered and signed as accurate and correct.

In response to Councillor Cuthbertson's question the Head of Development Management advised that there had been no downturn in the number of applications being received but that staff summer leave was a contributing factor to the fewer number of applications being on the agenda.

The Chair, Councillor Clarke stated that there was still a high throughput of applications on the validated list.

Matters for Decision

P141/16 Planning Applications for Determination

The Chair drew Members attention to the undernoted planning applications for determination.

LA09/2015/1209/F Dwelling and detached garage at 60m E of 45 Gulladuff Road, Maghera for Ronan O'Neill

Application listed for approval subject to conditions as per the officer's report.

Councillor McPeake declared an interest in this application.

Proposed by Councillor J Shiels Seconded by Councillor McKinney and

Resolved That planning application LA09/2015/1209/F be approved subject to conditions as per the officer's report.

LA09/2016/0164/F Replacement dwelling and garage at 17 Tobermore Road, Magherafelt for Mr O'Neill

The Head of Development Management presented a report on planning application LA09/2016/0164/F advising that it is recommended for approval.

The Chair advised the committee that requests to speak on the application had been received and invited Mr O'Kane to address the committee in the first instance.

Mr O'Kane stated that he lived adjacent to the application site and that the living areas of his home were to the rear of the house where his family spend 90% of their time. Mr O'Kane stated that the application would have an adverse impact on his family living space due to overshadowing and that late afternoon and evening sun will be blocked by this application. Mr O'Kane also advised that no one had visited his property to observe the relationship between the two properties.

Mr O'Kane advised that the proposed proximity and position of the replacement dwelling is also an issue as the replacement dwelling is proposed to move forward on the site which he felt will cause overbearance and overlooking to his own property. Mr O'Kane advised that his own property had a single storey side extension and was designed in sympathy with other nearby properties and asked that consideration be given to similar type of extension for this application. Mr O'Kane also stated that he had not objected to a previous application at 17 Tobermore Road.

Mr O'Kane asked that the Committee refuse the application due to the overshadowing and overbearance which will be caused to his own property.

Councillor Kearney advised he was speaking on behalf of the applicant and stated that the property at 17 Tobermore Road had been in the ownership of the O'Neill family since 2002 and that the application is intended to be a home for Mr O'Neill and his wife.

Councillor Kearney advised that the applicant did initially consider redevelopment of the current dwelling which is on site but now believes replacement of the dwelling to be more favourable. Councillor Kearney stated that the applicant accepts the application site is within an urban area but feels that the proposal will enhance the area. Councillor Kearney also advised that the applicant has sought to work with planners in relation to this application and has made attempts to overcome issues of concern.

Councillor Kearney advised that there is only one first floor window on the side extension which will overlook the property at 15 Tobermore Road, this will be a bathroom window with frosted glass. In addition, it was advised that the hipped end of the roof of the side extension has had its eaves dropped and if dropped any further will mean loss of room space.

Councillor Kearney stated that neither the height nor proximity of the proposal was excessive and that floor levels would not be changed. Councillor Kearney advised that the applicant accepted the right of neighbours to object to the application but felt that the proposal had been planned sympathetically.

Councillor Kearney withdrew to the public gallery

The Head of Development Management stated he had visited the application site that morning and accepted that the proposal will be in closer proximity to no. 15 than what is on site currently however attempts have been made by the applicant to resolve issues and stated that the proposed 12m separation between the two dwellings is generous. The Head of Development Management stated that overall the proposal was still acceptable.

Councillor Mallaghan entered the meeting at 7.17 pm

In response to Councillor Bell's question Mr O'Kane advised that the photographs submitted had been taken at dusk (10 pm approximately). Mr O'Kane stated that issues in relation to proximity needed to be addressed.

Councillor McPeake asked if overshadowing had been properly considered and if so he would be happy to propose the approval of the application.

The Head of Development Management advised that overshadowing and proximity had been given due consideration however a shadow analysis could also be requested which would provide further clarification if Members felt it would be of assistance.

Proposed by Councillor Gildernew Seconded by Councillor Bateson and

Resolved That a shadow analysis report be provided in relation to application LA09/2016/0164/F.

Councillor Reid asked if the shadow analysis was found acceptable if the application could be approved without coming back to committee.

The Council Solicitor advised that in theory the committee can delegate to the Planning Manager but felt that there would be new information, and it might be best if the application was brought back to committee.

Councillor Bateson asked how long a shadow analysis would take.

The Head of Development advised that a shadow analysis can be done by the agent on a software package and it would therefore depend how long it took the agent to prepare and submit the report.

Councillor Kearney rejoined the meeting.

LA09/2016/0310/F Dwelling and garage on a farm at lands 30m NW of 112 Sixtowns Road, Draperstown for Gerard McNamee

The Head of Development Management presented a report on planning application LA09/2016/0310/F advising that it is recommended for refusal.

The Chair advised the committee that a request to speak on the application had been received and invited Mr Cassidy to address the committee.

Mr Cassidy advised that the replacement dwelling was occupied by Ms Kathleen McNamee who died in November 2006. The property passed to the applicant following the completion of probate in 2012. Mr Cassidy referred to previously submitted maps which confirm that the replacement dwelling was never part of the applicant's farm.

Councillor Mallaghan asked for clarification regarding ownership of the application site.

Mr Cassidy advised that the applicant was in the process of acquiring the necessary lands.

The Head of Development Management felt that there was still some uncertainty surrounding the application.

Resolved That planning application LA09/2015/1166/O be approved subject to conditions as per the officer's report.

H/2014/0354/F Alteration and extension to existing retail building at Forbes Furniture, Station Road Industrial Estate, Magherafelt (Amended Scheme)

The Head of Development Management presented previously circulated report which gave consideration to Council's position on a planning appeal which was heard in June 2015, of which the appeal decision was subsequently quashed following a legal challenge to the Courts by Mr Forbes.

The Chair advised the committee that a request to speak on the application had been received and invited Mr Loughrey to address the committee.

Mr Loughrey advised he represented Castlefarm properties and their objection to the proposal.

Mr Loughrey advised that the initial draft reasons for refusal of the application related to retail impact and traffic safety concerns, this was appealed by the applicant who then went on to launch a legal challenge against the PAC decision when the appeal was dismissed. As the Planning Appeal decision was quashed in its entirety by the High Court and is to be reheard Mr Loughrey felt it was wrong of Council to change its position in relation to the planning application and not contest this appeal.

In relation to the SPPS, Mr Loughrey confirmed that an assessment of need as required by same, had not been carried out.

Mr Loughrey accepted the application had a valid certificate of lawfulness but did not feel this was a realistic fallback position and referred to the PAC's Report at the Article 31 Inquiry which referred to this applicant having only a theoretical fallback. He advised that his clients have an alternative site at Meadowlane which is within the town centre and is capable of accommodating such an application.

Mr Loughrey referred to the transport assessment and went on to advise that his client had now commissioned his own assessor with regard to traffic concerns.

Mr Loughrey stated that there was not enough evidence for Council to change its stance in relation to this application.

In response to Councillor Mallaghan's question the Head of Development Management advised that the application does have a Certificate of Lawfulness however, the key issue relating to the application is the potential of the fallback position available to the applicant, that is, whether it would be reasonable to force the application to move to a town centre location whenever a suitable building already exists.

Councillor Bateson referred to the SPPS which states that planning authorities should adopt a town centre first approach and the potential conflict this creates if Council do not contest the appeal.

The Head of Development Management advised that conditions have been attached to the application which will limit what can be sold on the premises.

Councillor McKinney referred to a Lidl supermarket only being metres away from the application site.

The Chair, Councillor Clarke stated it was important to manage the current situation in the best way possible.

Councillor Bell asked if assurances can be given that town centre businesses will not be negatively affected by this application.

The Head of Development Management advised that the conditions cited in the report which places a limit on the type of items which can be sold should be enough to provide a safeguard against any negative impact on the town centre.

Councillor J Shiels felt the issue before Members was whether they considered the application, with the conditions attached, will attract enough people out of the town to cause concern.

The Head of Development Management advised that Members were not being asked to determine the application but rather whether Council intended to contest the Appeal.

Councillor Bateson stated that this application should not be a back door approach to the applicant getting a supermarket.

Proposed by Councillor McPeake Seconded by Councillor Mallaghan and

Resolved That Council accept the recommendation not to contest the Appeal and will withdraw the sole planning reason for refusal for planning application H/2014/0354/F provided the proposal remains the same as that proposed in drawing SCH 02 dated 9 February 2015 and subject to the conditions as per the officer's report.

P142/16 Appeal Decisions Received

The Head of Development Management presented previously circulated report advising Members of recent decisions made by Planning Appeals Commission.

In relation to appeal decision for application I/2013/0249/O the Head of Development Management highlighted the decision of the Commissioner in which it was concluded that a group of farm dwellings can comprise of just a dwelling and domestic garage. Members were advised that this decision is in conflict with previous appeal decisions but that it will need to be kept in mind when considering future applications.

	This council resolves to write to and seek an urgent meeting with the Minister for Communities to discuss the need for legislative change to ensure that rate payers are best represented at all times and to ensure that there are no barriers to public life for those who seek elected office"
	The Minister for Communities has responded to the Council and has indicated that these matters have been raised with officials at a recent meeting of the Finance Working Group and has indicated that it would be appropriate to allow this process to conclude before deciding on whether or not a meeting should take place. A copy of response which is attached as Appendix A.

And calls on the Minister to acknowledge the contribution the voluntary and community sector in Mid Ulster have been making towards Mental Health issues in the community and ensures her department makes provision to support these organisations financially to continue their work in the future. We further request that he/she works closely with the Ministers of Health in other jurisdictions, to ensure equality of provision and to improve care and outcomes for all women, babies and families across this island.

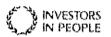

Thank you for your letter of 27 May, which outlined the Mid Ulster District Council motion on Perinatal Mental Health Services. My apologies for the delay in responding.

One of my key priorities is mental health and perinatal mental health is an extremely important element of this.

The Integrated Perinatal Mental Health Care Pathway, published by the Public Health Agency (PHA) in December 2012, is currently being updated to reflect recent national guidance (NICE Guideline 192) and the Regional Mental Health Care Pathway. The revised pathway, due to be published by PHA shortly, will provide guidance to all health and social care professionals who come into contact with women in the antenatal and postnatal period across all settings inclusive of primary care.

The Health and Social Care Board has developed outline proposals for the future development of specialist perinatal mental health services, in line with NICE Guideline 192. These proposals include specialist community based services and a regional mother and baby unit. Future development of these services is subject to additional resources being secured. I will be considering this, along with a large number of competing priorities, as part of the budget setting process for the period 2017/18 to 2019/20.

RQIA are carrying out a review of perinatal mental health and are due to share their initial findings and draft recommendations at a regional stakeholder event on 30 September 2016. These findings and recommendations will help inform future development of any perinatal mental health service.

I also recognise the important contribution made by the voluntary and community sector in respect of mental health issues in the community and look forward to working with them as we continue to reform Mental Health Services in the north of Ireland.
